HISTORY OF CHENANGO COUNTY

Historically for you and young at heart, this south central New York county is rich in colorful heritage with a scenic splendor that changes like magic with the seasons.

Chenango was formed from Herkimer and Tioga counties on March 15, 1798 and included 11 of the "Twenty Towns" in the "Governors Purchase" which was deeded to the State of New York in a treaty achieved through Governor George Clinton on September 22, 1788. The county also included several other tracts of land extending from present day Broome County to Oneida Lake.

When Chenango County was organized, it had ten towns: DeRuyter, Greene, Jericho, Norwich, Oxford, Brookfield, Cazenovia, Hamilton, Sangerfield and Sherburne. All of these towns have lost territory over the years, dividing to make new towns. In 1804 Sangerfield left Chenango County, and in 1806 Madison County was organized, creating the present north boundary of Chenango County.

The county seat was established in Norwich March 6, 1807, & its historical courthouse was built in the year 1837, replacing a wooden structure that was built shortly after 1807. The stone courthouse is remarkably preserved, and with its statue of the Goddess of Justice, its architecture draws national interest and reputation.

Named for the river which bisects it, Chenango means pleasant river flowing through the land of the bull thistle, a plant which has become the county symbol. It's not inappropriate.

It suggests our ties with the Indians as well as labors of the early settler and the clearing of lands which have made it one of the top dairying counties in the state.

HOSPICE and PALLIATIVE CARE of CHENANGO COUNTY

We are a non-profit health care agency that takes care of patients with serious life limiting illness (generally 6 months or less) in their home, nursing home, or hospital room. Referrals are welcome from physicians and other healthcare providers, family members, friends, clergy or from the patient him/herself. Patients receive regular visits from Registered Nurses, LPNs, Social Workers, and specially trained volunteers. Medications and medical equipment is most often included in a patient's plan of care for which Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance companies reimburse Hospice. Patients rarely, if ever, receive a bill for Hospice services.

For those individuals with a longer life expectancy who are

not yet ready for Hospice care, Palliative (comfort) care may be more appropriate. Our staff consults with the palliative patient regarding pain and symptom management. Plus we provide emotional support for those still receiving life-prolonging medical intervention such as chemotherapy or radiation. Our Palliative care services are provided on a sliding fee scale if not covered by your insurance.

Grief support groups get together regularly, and volunteer training is active several times during the year. HISTORY OF OTSEGO COUNTY

The close of the Revolutionary War found the valley lands of the Susquehanna River and its tributaries still sparsely settled. However, strong factors were now pushing colonists westward. In 1787 a treaty with the Indians had pushed the so-called Indian Frontier to the far side of the Unadilla River, out of the area called Otsego. Also, most of the lands east of this had been sold or granted by the Colonial government to men who were land speculators. The land had been surveyed and divided into lots ready for disposal. Frequently these grants required that these lands become tenanted.

One of these landowners had visited the northern part of the area and been so impressed that he had an unusual approach for the newcomers. He knew they had very little money, so he suggested a small down payment with a mortgage on the rest, and only small interest. The colonist, thus, could anticipate the future ownership of the property and was given a definite incentive to improve it. This was how William Cooper, formerly of New Jersey, became the greatest colonizer in New York State, disposing of his lands and acting as agent for many other landowners. This method was in great contrast to the rental system existing in surrounding areas and the rental wars caused by it. Cooper's first sales were in 1786.

As early as 1741 a settlement called Cherry Valley was made on the east-west turnpike. This and Cooper's town, the village established by William Cooper, were in what had been called Tryon County. In 1784 it had been renamed Montgomery County. The state began to realize Montgomery County was too large so in 1791 the three towns of Cherry Valley, Cooperstown and Harpersfield were put in Otsego County which was erected for that purpose. In 1812 the state named Cooper's town was no longer just the town of Otsego, but now Cooperstown in the town of Otsego and the county seat. Today there are 24 towns in the county.

Otsego County had many features which appealed to the newcomers. There were two large navigable rivers with many tributaries which flowed south crossing the state. This would furnish transportation to the south through Pennsylvania, even to Baltimore. The gentle sloping hills were covered with virgin timber of many desirable kinds. The timber was accessible and could be floated downstream during high water. Wagon trains could also be easily loaded with timber and sent to Albany or to the Hudson. Wild lands were valuable for they were a great source of pearl and potash. Maple sugar could be made and there was honey and beeswax for the gathering. The many wild animals would furnish skins and meat. The pioneers liked what they saw.

Agriculture was to become the most important industry of the county. The other industries would depend on it and be determined by its demands. As early as 1800 a surprising business developed. Because of the abundance of cheap water power, cotton was shipped via the Hudson River and hauled over the Catskills to be processed and woven. Another important factory not connected with the farm involved the production of the tinsmiths. On a high specially designed wagon the

tin peddler visited all the rural areas. Rags of all kinds were sold to the papermill. First they were sorted, then the linen rags were used to make the best quality of paper; woolen and cotton rags for the poorer grades, and wrapping paper out of the jute bags. Phinney's printing presses in Cooperstown were the source of 8,000 Bibles and many thousand other books annually, and used much of this paper, as did the local newspapers. In the 1840's hop raising became a major crop. In fact, in 1885 over three million pounds were raised in the valley. By 1860 New York State was raising nearly 90% of the hops raised in the United States and one third of these came from Otsego County and considered of the best quality. But this hop raising required many supplies such as poles, string, bags, special drying and much labor. Then labor problems developed and disease hit the vines. So ended the hop raising.

Education was not forgotten. The town of Cherry Valley which was settled in 1741 was to win the reputation of having the first church west of the Hudson where preaching was in English. The town's minister was the Reverend Samuel Dunlop of Trinity College, Dublin. Knowing the importance of learning, he started a school for local boys. Popular demand produced a boarding school and this was the first classical school west of the Hudson, est. 1742. When Cherry Valley rebuilt after the massacre of 1778, an academy was established there which rivaled Union and Columbia both in reputation and number of students.

Other schools followed. John Christopher Hartwick labored long for a Lutheran Seminary and it was finally opened in 1815. It was the first Lutheran Seminary in the United States. It moved to Brooklyn in 1929. Hartwick College in Oneonta was an outgrowth of the old Seminary. Long established on another of Oneonta's hills was the training school which grew into the Oneonta Normal School. In 1938 the 4 year college course was inaugurated and it became a unit of the State University system.

Early settlers had been of many races including the Scotch Irish, Hollanders, Germans, Palatine Germans, English and especially Yankees or New Englanders. Later others would come. German skill and Yankee ingenuity devised many valuable inventions which would improve all kinds of business. George Fairchild was to forsee the possibilities of I.B.M. machines, and to actively promote them, thereby making millionaires out of his investing friends. His son, Sherman, was to be the inventor of the early 1920s-70s. The Huntingtons, Collis and Henry, became railroad magnates and helped develop the west. There were others who, both home and away, became influential politicians, lawyers, judges - the list goes on. One, James Fenimore Cooper, must be named. Many of his stories, based on local and now called Leatherstocking tales, were the first to bring popularity to the area as young and old read them.

Today Otsego County is still a dairy county with beef and sheep raising. Gone are most of the factories. Even the railroad is a shadow of the past. Today Oneonta is an educational center. The county concentrates on its many recreational fea-

tures. There is the Baseball Hall of Fame and its library in honor of supposed baseball founder, Abner Doubleday. Several museums, especially the Farmers' Museum and the Fenimore House, filled with collections of all kinds, are found in Cooperstown. The lakes afford both winter and summer sports. Hiking, hunting, fishing, etc. even just enjoying beautiful homes, historical places, the serenity of the country-side and the peaceful life indicated, awaits you.

OTSEGO COUNTY RECYCLING

The following recycling information covers Otsego County. Recyclables may be taken to the Oneonta Transfer Station, the Cooperstown Transfer Station, local drop-off sites, or picked up by a hauler.

Recyclables should be brought to the transfer stations or local drop-off sites loose, not in plastic bags. However, newspapers may be left in brown paper bags. Residents should contact their haulers to find out if the hauler will pick up recyclables loose or in clear plastic bags.

If clear plastic bags are used, they must be closed with one bag for containers and one bag for magazines and newspapers. During wet weather, please hold on to paper materials until the next pick-up.

All recyclables must be clean. Labels may be left on containers.

CONTAINER GROUP

Plastics

Bottles and containers with the recycling codes #1 and #2 only. Caps should be removed and placed in the trash.

Unacceptable plastic includes margarine tubs, yogurt containers, cottage cheese containers, microwave dishes, pill bottles, toys, deli containers, plastic bags, laundry baskets and wastepaper baskets.

Tin / Aluminum

Food cans and pet food cans only. Lids should be squeezed inside the can. Aluminum foil balls and / or baking pans are acceptable, but must be clean and free of food and debris.

Unacceptable tin/aluminum includes aerosol cans, paint cans, hazardous material containers, small appliances, pots, pans, coffee pots and tea pots.

Glass

Jars and bottles only. Metal lids should be removed and placed in the recycling bag. Plastic caps go in the trash.

Unacceptable glass items include drinking glasses, mirrors, cosmetic jars, ceramics, dishes, auto glass, light bulbs and Pyrex.

Poly-Coated Cartons

All paper beverage cartons. This includes clean milk, juice and drink box containers.

Unacceptable materials include waxed freezer boxboard, such as ice cream cartons and frozen food trays.

PAPER GROUP

Corrugated Cardboard

Clean, dry corrugated only. No "yellow or foreign card-board." Clean, dry, non-coated paper bags are also acceptable.

Unacceptable cardboard includes plastic-coated boxes, tissue boxes, beer cases, pasta and cereal boxes, paper towel tubes and packing tubes.

Newspaper: Call clean and dry newspaper is acceptable. All inserts are acceptable.

Magazines: Clean, dry glossy-coated magazine stock only.

Boxboard

All clean non-corrugated cardboard. Must be flattened. This includes soda and beer cases, cereal boxes, shoe boxes, notebook backings, egg cartons, gift boxes, etc.

Unacceptable materials include waxed, plastic-coated, wet or food-contaminated box board.

Mixed Paper Program

There is a voluntary mixed paper program on a drop-off basis only. Mixed paper must be brought directly to the transfer stations.

Acceptable materials: Magazines; color inserts (flyers); junk mail; construction paper; office paper (any color); non-metallic wrapping paper; text books (remove covers); file folders; envelopes (windows OK); school paper; self-stock note products; NCR paper; computer paper; manila envelopes; catalogs.

Collection of household hazardous wastes are scheduled on specific days for Otsego County residents. Pre-registration is



required. Watch local media or call the county Solid Waste office for more information.

Tires

Automotive and truck tires are accepted at the Oneonta transfer station only for a fee. For more information, call MOSA at 607-432-9540.

Used Motor Oil: Used automotive motor oil is accepted at most service stations.

Appliances: Some towns hold a voluntary white goods day once a year. Watch local media or call your town clerk for details. Used appliances can be brought to the Oneonta transfer station for a fee.

HISTORY OF AFTON

What is now Afton has been called Clinton, Jericho, South Bainbridge, and Afton. The first settler was Hezekiah Stowell who came to Bettsburgh, the first community in the town. A Vermont Sufferer from Guilford, Vermont, he arrived in 1786. The Landers family of Lenox, Massachusetts, arrived the same year. The Town of Afton was separated from Bainbridge in 1857 to become the youngest town in Chenango County. Afton Village was incorporated in 1892.

The name Afton was suggested by Joseph Bennett Chaffee, and was derived from the poem "Afton Water" by the Scottish poet, Robert Burns. It was intended that Afton would precede Bainbridge in any alphabetical list.

The Indian village of Cunahunta was located near the present Village of Afton. It was destroyed by Col. William Butler in a raid from Schoharie in October of 1778. The islands near Afton were a campsite for the troops of Gen. James Clinton in August, 1779, when he came from Otsego Lake to join Gen. John Sullivan in a campaign against the Indians of then Western New York.

A landmark near the Afton Fairgrounds is the Universalist Church, no longer used for services, but erected in 1818-1819 as a union building by Universalists and Presbyterians.

The former site of the Mormon House on the Afton Fairgrounds is noted by a state marker. Here, Joseph Smith, founder of the Mormon Church, was married to Emma Hale by Justice of the Peace, Zechariah Tarbell, on Jan. 18, 1827.

Afton has never been an industrial town, but in 1916 the Ansco Company built a plant near Afton Lake to use its pure water for the manufacture of nitrocellulose for photographic film. The plant was unprofitable and was razed in the 1930's.

For many years, Afton Central School has been the largest employer in town.

Two noted Aftonians were Bert Lord and Dr. Carlton J.H. Hayes. Bert Lord was a New York State Assemblyman and Senator and then Representative from New York in the U.S. Congress. Dr. Hayes had a long career as Professor of History at Columbia University and was U.S. Ambassador to Spain during World War II.

FRANKLIN

HISTORY OF FRANKLIN

In the early days, many early settlers came from the New England states, Massachusetts & Connecticut. There was a very rough trail from Catskill, on the Hudson to Wattles Ferry at Unadilla on the Susquehanna River.

It was first thought Franklin should be at Leonta, where the Turnpike & the Oneonta road meet. As more people settled farther south, a church & other industry moved to the present site.

In 1792-93 the village held their first official meeting to organize a charter. In these times, the farmers were very self supporting. They had brought horses or oxen to work the land, a cow, chickens & other animals to be used for their meat. They raised potatoes, later apples & grain. In winter the extra milk was separated & butter made which was sold in spring & shipped to markets in Philadelphia.

In the early 1800s the Catskill Turnpike was improved & toll booths built to collect tolls to maintain the road.

In 1834-35 concerned citizens felt that an institution for higher education should be organized. Under their leadership, five leading citizens petitioned the State Board of Education to build what was called Delaware Literary Institute or D.L.I. in April of 1835. In June of 1836 it was opened for ladies and in November classes opened for the gentlemen. This brought prosperity to the community and was known for its well trained students over a large area.

Croton, a small community on the Catskill Turnpike in the town of Franklin, was later called Treadwell. In November of 1927, a meeting was held for the purpose of a central school to be built. This was approved and later called Kellogg schools, now a part of the Delaware Academy.

As the forest was cleared and more land used for farming, the number of cows increased. In the late 1800s, small creameries were built like the district schools in areas of need. Some were in Bartlett Hollow, Leonta, Croton or Treadwell, South Franklin and Bennett Hollow. In the winter the neighbors got together to cut ice and put it in the ice house for

summer use. The ice was cut nearly through with a power saw on runners and smaller were made by ice spuds size 12-14 inches thick by 2x3 foot blocks. These were put in the ice house and covered with sawdust to keep for summer use. One remaining ice house is the town garage at Pat's Pond.

As buses & trucks came into use, the small creameries and district schools centralized. Two large creameries in Franklin were a Meridale and a Dairymen's League. Later, a branch of a Rockdale Creamery was built across Otego Road from Matteson's. The ice was used on the trucks to keep the milk cold until it reached the creamery, as it was shipped in 40 quart or 10 gallon cans.

In the late 1930s, electric lights were extended to the outlying regions; now the farmer has an electric milker & cooler making it easier to have more cows. From a few cows, now we have dairies with 100-200 milking cows and the milk is picked up in tank trucks which in some areas go right on to the cities for processing. Breakstone's in Walton is about the only milk processing plant in Delaware County at this time.

In 1992, we celebrated our bicentennial; Franklin is over 225 yrs. old & going strong!

GUILFORD

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF GUILFORD

The land which today we call Guilford was once the land of the Oneida tribe of the Iroquois Nation. According to the Fort Stanwick Treaty of 1784, land west of the Unadilla River was Indian territory. After the Revolutionary War the Indian land was sold and settlers could cross the river and begin the first settlements. In 1789 Joshua and John Mersereau, Revolutionary War spies for George Washington, came to what is today East Guilford..

The new century saw the first roads into the township which were called turnpikes. This enabled stages and teamsters to bring families and goods into the area. Hamlets began to grow each with a post office and a few small businesses such as inns and blacksmith shops. The township was formed in 1813 when it split from Oxford. It was then called Eastern as it was the eastern part of Oxford. In 1817 the name was changed to Guilford from the many settlers who came from Guilford, CT. The Township of Guilford was formed. As the years passed, Guilford Center was replaced by Guilford as the industrial center. Mt. Upton, Rockwell Mills, Rockdale and East Guilford grew after the railroad arrived.

At the turn of the 20th Century the hamlets were industrial in nature with mills, the railroad and various businesses. The first two decades saw the age of the telephone and electricity. Purley Merchant and L.H. Anthony started a telephone exchange and provided local service in Guilford. Electricity replaced water power for industry and many of the mills that ran on water power went out of business. The dairy industry however was still the most profitable. With the coming of the automobile the hamlets started to become a vacation and residential community.

While many businesses fell during the Depression, the hamlets of Guilford continued as a prosperous community until the O&W Railroad went bankrupt in 1957. Passenger service stopped in 1954 and the last milk train ran through Guilford in 1958. Tanker trucks replaced the railroad with the hauling of milk and because they could stop at individual farms they eventually caused local creameries to go out of business.

At the beginning of the 21st Century, the decline in farming has been a major issue in each of the hamlets. As farm land has been sold, a change in population has made each of the hamlets a more residential and tourist community. Guilford Lake still attracts tourists as well as residents for its natural beauty and the Unadilla River which borders the other three hamlets finds canoeists from many parts of the country. Such businesses and the natural wonders of the area provides the attraction for newcomers.

Our township also has a wealth of history and historical remains that compels one to search for more. Questions such as, what is the origin of the mysterious 'stone piles' of Guilford, makes us search further. The 22 cemeteries in the township, some small and some large, tell the tales of past lives that make our township what it is today. In the census in

1990 the population of Guilford was 2875 and hopefully it will continue to grow as people find the tranquility and wonders of this rural township an excellent place to live.

HISTORY OF HARPURSVILLE

Harpursville is located along the Susquehanna River in the picturesque town of Colesville. The earliest settlers, John Lamphere, Lemuel and Nathaniel Badger settled north of Harpursville in 1785. After serving in our state government, Robert Harpur bought large tracts of land in the Colesville area and settled here in 1787. It is for this famous man that Harpursville was named.

The first religious services were held in 1793 and in 1799 St. Lukes Episcopal Church was organized with the church being built in 1828. The oldest Episcopal Church in Broome County, St. Lukes closed in 1968, but has been restored as an informative and interesting local museum.

Another landmark was the Eldorado Inn, a beautiful hotel which burned down in 1933. Due to the lack of firefighting services to save this beautiful historic building, a volunteer fire company was formed and the firestation was built on this site. The first Post Office in Harpursville was established in

The site of the present Harpursville school is the original site with the brick high school being the third building there. in order to preserve the history of the original Colesville schools, the school building from Doraville was moved to a site in back of the Colesville Town Hall. The Doraville School has been restored and is an educational museum for the public to visit.

MT. UPTON

HISTORY OF MT. UPTON - FOUNDED 1787

Mt Upton is located on the East side of the Unadilla River and is one of many hamlets located in the Township of Guilford. When you mention Mt. Upton you also think of Rockwells Mills, a mile to the North, Latham's Corners, two miles north and Rockdale, three miles to the south.

Mt. Upton was first settled by Ezekiel Wheeler in approximately 1787. The name Mt. Upton (Mount Upton) originated from the mount (mountain) on the eastern side of the Unadilla River which was a part of the Upton Patent.

Some of the oldest landmarks still standing in the area are "The Old Mill" restaurant and "Lady Upton's" grave. The mill in Rockwells Mills produced woolen cloth during the second half of the 19th century which was used to make Army uniforms. Mt. Upton is probably most known for "Lady Upton", a work horse, owned by Coldwell Chamberlain, who became a noted race horse winning many races in the Eastern and middle United States and Canada. She died at the old age of 43, March 12, 1907.

In the 21st Century our largest business is Husted's Milk Trucking; we have a gas station/mini-mart; All Star Automotive garage; two churches; DeForest's Repair and a Post Office. We have less than six working farms in the whole valley and our school has been merged with a neighboring village. Employment is found in factories and businesses in neighboring towns and cities within Chenango and neighboring Counties. We have to shop and obtain medical attention in Norwich, Sidney or beyond.

OTEGO

HISTORY OF OTEGO

In 1996, the town of Otego celebrated a date significant in its history. On February 5, 1796, the towns of Suffrage, Otego and Butternuts were formed from the town of Unadilla. Suffrage covered what later became Milford and a large part of Oneonta, Butternuts included present day Morris, and Otego comprised the balance of the area afterwards Oneonta, Laurens, and that portion of Otego lying east of the Otsdawa (from Huntington's Old Time Notes, vol. 5). Later other boundary changes were made; in 1807 by a vote of 138 to 121, it was decided to divide Otego which until then had included West Laurens and parts of Oneonta. Another item in Huntington's Notes says the Otego Post Office was in what became Oneonta Plains.

While the name Old Otego was used for this area, the village at least was listed in 1810 as Hamburg. In Spafford's Gazetteer of 1820, Hamburg was said to contain 30 houses. On April 12, 1822, the town of Huntsville was formed and apparently included some land from Unadilla and Franklin. Huntsville was named for Ransom Hunt, and early settler who owned the hotel where the town meeting was held and he also owned grist mills and other businesses. Again from Huntington's Notes, April 17,1830. The name of the town of Huntsville is changed to Otego while most of the old town of Otego with the addition of a portion of Milford is now embraced in the new town of Oneonta, formed this day. The History of Otsego Co. (1878) lists Otego and Huntsville existing together in 1830.

Early settlers in Otego included the Brimmers, Ogdens, Blakelys, Calders, Bundys and Hunts. Some residents of Otego today are descended from these early arrivals. The stories of these and other families parallel the development of the town and are recorded in A History of Otego (1907) by Dr. Stuart Banyar Blakely and A Bicentennial History of Otego (1976) by Helena Myers. The village of Otego was incorporated in 1892 and a brief history of the village was written by Helen Secor Groves in 1992.

Present day Otego is a pleasant, active community, Otego is the headquarters for the New York State Archeological Association, housed in the Roland B. Hill Museum.

Many new houses, streets, and developments have appeared since the last complete listing of the houses and occupants was made, nearly 20 years ago. An appeal has been made to residents to write a biography of their houses, giving the history, if known, and the present circumstances. These biographies could be left at the town clerk's office or Harris Memorial Library. Helen S. Groves, August 1995.

SIDNEY

HISTORY OF SIDNEY

Rev. William Johnston from New England in 1772 traveled down the Susquehanna River to the junction of the Unadilla River, just below Sidney to establish better relations with the Indians who had lived in this area for more than a thousand years. Rev. Johnston moved his family to the Sidney area, they fled to Cherry Valley during the Revolutionary War. In 1784 his sons Whitter and Hugh returned to Sidney, along with their widowed mother and sisters. The following year they built a log cabin on Brant Hill on the property Rev. Johnston had purchased in 1770 from Goldsborough Banyor. This land is situated on the west side of what is now known as Sidney. The 500 acres (or more) was along the Susquehanna from Carrs Creek to a "line" south of the Unadilla River back as far as where Gifford Road now is.

With the Revolutionary War, the Indians sided with the Tories and began total destruction in the Sidney area. After the war this area was known as Johnston Settlement and began to grow again.

Sidney was separated from the town of Franklin, April 7, 1801, with the first elected supervisor being Col. Whitter Johnston. Also in 1801 the town was named SIDNEY probably for Sir Sidney Smith, a British admiral who was famous at that time. The name was suggested by John Mandeville, an English schoolmaster.

Sidney has had many names – Johnston Settlement, Susquehanna Flats, Sidney Plains and finally Sidney. The village was incorporated in 1888 with the Hon. Ira E. Sherman serving as the first president (now would be called Mayor).

As a farming community, it had the needed country store, tavern, blacksmith shop, saw and gristmill and tanneries. A dam somewhere near the existing bridge gave power for these businesses. Timber was much in demand for shipbuilding in the Philadelphia area and since the Johnstons owned 250 acres of virgin white pine, the timbers were floated down the Susquehanna River to Pennsylvania during high water in the spring.

Early Businesses. In 1853 along with the toll house by the

bridge, there was a blacksmith shop, Rogers store, a wagon shop owned by Kellogg, a Methodist Church and Presbyterian Church, one hotel and a shoe shop. Population for Sidney Plains in 1853 was about 60.

At one time there were seven hotels, including Hotel Sidney built in 1885 on the corner of Cartwright and Main Streets. There were 35 guest rooms, steam heat and a good livery. This hotel was rated as the finest hotel between Binghamton and Albany. In 1887 the National Bank was located in this hotel, moving to Main Street in 1914.

In 1886 the population had grown to 933 people and 184 houses.

Other early industries - Mr. Fowler, selling hassocks and ottomans, John Wagner's brickyard, creamery on Squire Hill, harness makers, barbershops, Fisher Steam Mill making butter tubs and pails. 1887 Sidney Advertising Clock Co. and Palmer and Johnson Paper Mill. 1889 Sidney Novelty Works making swings, folding chairs, wheelbarrows, etc. 1891 Binghamton Glass Works opened a branch in Sidney (several pieces on display at the Sidney Historical Rooms). 1892 a sash and blind factory and 1893.

J.H. Clark Silk Mill. In 1895 Cortland Cart and Carriage Co. moved from Cortland to Sidney, the same year Philip Brady began a cigar business. 1902 a Woodenware Works, 1918 the Hatfield Cars, 1926 Scintilla and 1946 Keith Clark. In June of 1996 Keith Clark celebrated being in Sidney 50 years. Keith Clark is now known as ACCO.

SIDNEY CENTER

HISTORY OF SIDNEY CENTER

"Sidney Centre" was the name assigned to our village when the first post office was established in the early 1800s. Earlier inhabitants were the Iroquois or Five Nation Indians. First non-native settlers were Jacob & Martha Bidwell in 1792, who cleared land for a farm on Wheat Hill/Franklin Depot Road. Other settlers migrated from Connecticut and other New England states. The Bidwells and other early settlers are buried in the Pioneer Cemetery in a field across from the present Highland Cemetery.

The first one-room schoolhouse was located on Wheat Hill/Franklin Depot Road; first school building was built around 1871 south of the present elementary school. That building burned and a new school was built 1908; which was used until 1956 when the present elementary school building was completed.

The first religious meetings were held in homes and then the schoolhouses at Sagendorf's corner. A church building was started about 1850; however, there was a disagreement causing separation into Baptists, Methodist-Episcopal and Congregational. The Baptist and Methodist built their own churches with the Congregationalist complete the church building. The present Baptist church is the same one built at the time of the split. The Methodist Church was built and dedicated February 2, 1897 and burned to the ground at the hands of arsonists in 2009.

Sidney Center was well known throughout the country for its two railroad trestles; one being 96' above the ground and 1220' curving from one hill to another. The first train crossed the trestle in November 1871. It faithfully served the community, transporting milk and farm products, mail and passengers. The O&W ran here for many years until March 29, 1957 when the railroad went bankrupt. The station was called Maywood by the railroad rather than Sidney Center, so the railroad personnel could distinguish it from Sidney. The Maywood Historical Group of Sidney Center now owns the depot building and property. A portion of the building is the original depot. In Sidney Center's bicentennial year, 1992, the outside of the depot was stained and painted the original O&W colors by the Historical Group and many volunteers. Memorial donations of money, materials, stain and paint made the renovation and restoration of this landmark possible. Railroad Day has become an annual event at the Maywood Historical depot; with displays of O&W memorabilia and souvenirs, videos, slides and pictures.

The Depot is located on Maywood Lane, off upper Depot Street (County Route 35).

UNADILLA

HISTORY OF UNADILLA

(submitted by William Bauer)

The original Unadilla was settled about 1770 at the confluence of the Susquehanna and Unadilla Rivers. The name "Unadilla," one spelling from a number of different interpretations of several Native American dialects, is said to mean, "Where the waters meet" indicating the junction of the two rivers. More commonly this is shortened to "Meeting Place."

At about the same time the location of the village now called Unadilla was settled, by a group of Scotch-Irish near the junction of the Ouleout Creek with the Susquehanna River. Both communities were destroyed during the

UNADILLA

Revolutionary War.

After the war, settlers returned and in 1791 the Town of Unadilla, in Otsego County, was created. The Village of Unadilla was incorporated in 1889.

In the early ninteeth century Unadilla became an importmant stop for westbound travelers, the Catskill-Susquehanna Turnpike crossing the river at Wattles Ferry, which was located at the eastern end of the village. Unadilla became known as "The Gateway to the Finger Lakes Region."

By 1870 the turnpikes were replaced in importance by the Albany and Susquehanna Railroad (The Delaware and Hudson Railrod). Taking advantage of progress, the community continued to prosper with commerce, agriculture, and manufacturing.

Unadilla, call "The Village Beautiful" is located in the southeast corner of Otsego County on the beautiful Susquehanna River. the surrounding area is generaly called the "Tri-Town." This includes the villages of Unadilla, Bainbridge, and Sidney. Today, Sidney has become the commercial and industrial center of the area whereas Unadilla has remianed a most attractive residential community.

Because of its architecture, the Main Street of Unadilla has been designated a Historic District by the National Register of Historic Places.


